

Main texts governing fecal sludge management

THE 1991 CONSTITUTION

Article 29 confers that « the right to a healthy environment is recognized; the protection, defense and promotion of the environment are a duty for all ».

• THE ENVIRONMENTAL CODE (ACT NO. 006-2013/AN)

Several articles address fecal sludge management, and the most relevant are found in Section 2, Paragraph 4 « On rainwater management, wastewater and excreta», articles 80 to 82

• THE PUBLIC HYGIENE CODE (ACT NO. 022-2005/AN)

Several provisions address sanitation issues. Articles 8 and 11 are the most relevant and stipulate that boroughs or other decentralized districts shall ensure the disposal of excreta and wastewater, and that they are responsible for equipping their own agglomerations with appropriate sanitation facilities.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES CODE (ACT NO. 055-2004/AN, REVISED IN 2009)

It ordains the transfer of sanitation-related skills to local authorities (articles 89, 93, 94, 102, 103).


o DECREE NO. 98-323 OF JULY 28, 1998

It regulates the collection, storage, transport, treatment and disposal of urban waste, including wastewater and excreta.

Environment, Water and Sanitation Sectoral Policy (PS-EEA 2018-2027): Its elaboration responds to the State's imperative to be in phase with National Economic and Social Development Plan (PNDES).
